One of the major emphases for NACTRC is the support, education and development of the research community in the area of finances. We are pleased to partner with Sharon Appelman-Eszczuk and Sergey Nikitin to offer the Budgeting Seminar this November (details TBA). This seminar was first delivered last May as part of the Clinical Research Seminar Series that is colled by Dr. Jill Byrne, Director of Clinical Research FoMD and our team at NACTRC. Sharon and Sergey are also developing a budgeting course to be offered in the New Year and modelled after the Research Coordinator course in order to provide greater depth and breadth of training and information.

NACTRC recently hired Simon Wong as Director of Finance to support a number of initiatives from the financial perspective. We are exploring and piloting systems with researchers that provide the electronic organization of logistics, finances and reporting. These systems integrate well with the new clinical information system, EPIC, offering further opportunities to streamline many aspects of conducting research.

As the research enterprise becomes more electronic, we have partnered with AHS finance to support the electronic funds transfer (EFT) process and AHS finance is anticipating the release of electronic account information for all investigators in multiple formats, including Excel and PDF.

We partnered with Alberta Health Services and the University of Alberta to support a public awareness initiative on the importance of getting involved with health research. The campaign generated over 4.5 million impressions during its 8 week run.
